WOMEN IN BUSINESS

The EU supports women entrepreneurs in Belarus through the **Women in Business** programme, which is implemented by the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD). Support provided by the programme includes **business advice**, **training** and **mentoring** to women-led companies.

Woman-led paper manufacturer in Belarus, **Gofrobum** received assistance with marketing and corporate website development under the Women in Business project. As a result, their **productivity grew by 127%**, and their **customer base increased by 39%**.

Through its **Erasmus+** programme, the EU offers young women and men in Belarus a huge range of exchange opportunities across Europe.

Tamara Sakolchik was one of the first Belarusian participants in the Erasmus programme. Today Tamara is 30 years old, and is a successful lawyer in Minsk.

- Belarus was provided more than €4 million in funding for student and staff exchanges under Erasmus+ in 2015-17, with 987 students and staff from Belarus benefitting from exchanges to EU universities.
- The EU has set a **75% target to support young women** under the **EU4Youth** programme that runs until 2020.

A FAIR SOCIETY

An EU-funded project – **SAFETY. Right to Live without Violence** – promotes the right of women and children to a safe family environment free from violence and abuse. The project seeks to provide shelter to victims of domestic violence and to create support services for them.

AS A RESULT OF WORK DONE SO FAR:

- 93 families with 238 children have received integrated support with finding ways out from their difficult situations.
- A shelter has been opened in the village of Baraŭliany in the Minsk district for victims of domestic violence – 11 mothers and 19 children have received assistance.
- Three self-support groups have been set up for joint decision making on complicated family issues.
- Workshops on helping victims of domestic violence have been held for professionals (psychologists, staff of social services, socio-pedagogical centres, specialised NGOs, etc.).
- SOS hotlines have been set up for women at risk.
- Targeted awareness raising for women at risk.

«The key thing is that the project really helps. We have not been able to deal with the violence problem ourselves. The centre offers comfortable accommodation for mothers with children for a time when they have to stay outside their homes, and the work with psychologists has brought positive results to both my children and to me.»
