In its cooperation with Georgia, the EU is driving real change by strengthening **women in business**, providing **opportunities for quality education** and promoting **a fair society**.

WHAT IS BEING DONE

- MORE WOMEN IN BUSINESS Making loans via local banks available for women-led enterprises

WOMEN IN BUSINESS

The EU supports women entrepreneurs in Georgia through the **Women in Business** programme, which is implemented by the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD). Support provided by the programme includes **business advice**, **training** and **mentoring** to women-led companies.

With help from Women in Business, the womenowned **23rd Policlinic of Treatment & Diagnostic Centre** in Tbilisi has received ISO certification, added an emergency department, conducted rebranding, purchased new medical equipment and increased the volume of operations it carries out. Following the project, the company's management signed contracts with three insurance companies for providing medical services for their clients.

- **YOUNG WOMEN LEADERS** Enhancing the active participation of young women through the EU4Youth programme

NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

Through its **Erasmus+** programme, the EU offers young women and men in Georgia a huge range of exchange opportunities across Europe.

- Georgia was provided with more than €13 million in funding for student and staff exchanges under Erasmus+ in 2015-17, with 2,497 students and staff from Georgia benefiting from exchanges to EU universities.
- The EU has set a **75% target to support young women** under the **EU4Youth** programme that runs until 2020.

A FAIR SOCIETY

An EU-funded project – **Unite to eliminate domestic violence and empower women and girls for a better future in Georgia** – is combatting domestic violence by providing support for victims of violence, as well as campaigning for the prevention of domestic violence and abuse, and empowering women and girls in Georgia to become agents for change. The activities take place mainly in Tbilisi and the regions of Kakheti and Kvemo Kartli.

AS PART OF THE PROJECT:

- more than **60,000 women** have used free legal counselling services offered with EU support;
- grants, as well as mentoring and support have been provided for business initiatives aimed at empowering women who are victims of domestic violence.
